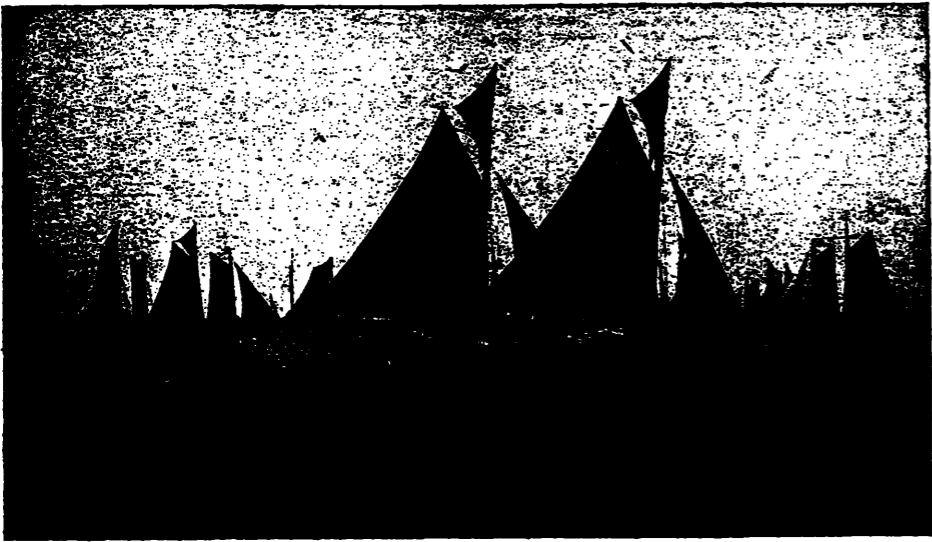

The Purpose of a New and Wide-Awake Organization

One of the organizations for the betterment of the industrial conditions of the community, is the Port Norris Commercial League, which was organized April 25, 1921, with Dr. Chas. E. Sharp as president; Bert Blanchard, clothier, vice president; Willis D. Robbins, Jr., of the Corner Drug Store, secretary; William Massey, manager of the American Store, treasurer. The president is supported by a number of committees such as are necessary to carry on the work of the association. The aim of the association is to show the surrounding country that Port Norris is alive to all that is progressive and beneficial to the social and commercial interests of the town. Port Norris is located just right for a manufacturing center, and if capital can be shown the advantages and natural resources, there is no reason why Port Norris cannot become one of the principle cities in South Jersey.

They have been very active in various ways and results can already be seen from their efforts. town slogan is "Port Norris for Business or Pleasure." This covers a wide scope and is true in all ways, as there is more business in Port Norris for the size of the town than any other place of like size, and when it comes to pleasure or social life, or whatever may be a pleasure to the different classes of people, Port Norris can satisfy them. This slogan is being spread broad cast over the United States through various forms of printed matter. Without exaggeration there are between 1000 and 1500 visitors here each week, and after being entertained satisfactorily here they are sure to speak a good word for Port Norris, and in the end the town will become known as a good place in which to locate for manufacturing industries and to live in also. Port Norris wants manufacturing industries and is going to do all it can to induce them to locate here. The league is composed of all the influential men of the town and everybody is "boosting for Port Norris."

BOOST FOR THE BRIDGE

The Commercial League is working to have a bridge placed across the Maurice River at the end of Main street connecting Port Norris with the shore road, thus opening up trade with these towns and also cutting off about eight or ten miles from the present route to the seashore cities. This would be a great saving to

autoists as the route from Bridgeton to the shore would be made much shorter. It is expected that the autoists and business people of Bridgeton and other places along the line will help bring this much-needed improvement, as it would be a great asset to the county. "Boost for a bridge across the Maurice River at Port Norris" is the slogan. Let's all boost!

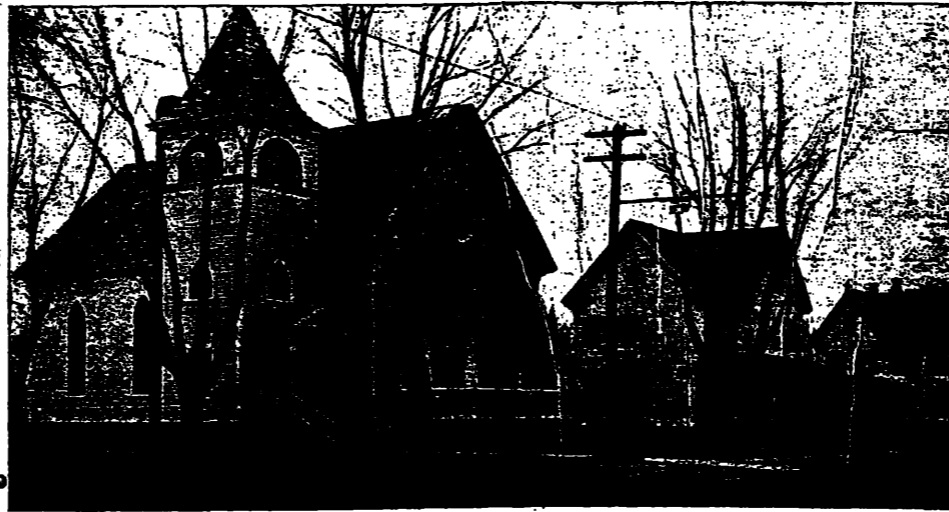
